Mission Statement


Head Start provides a supportive environment that encourages children, families, staff, and communities to thrive by identifying strengths and opportunities, and developing strong partnerships to meet needs.

West Central Head Start operates a publicly funded program that serves children birth to 5 and pregnant women in Douglas, Grant, Otter Tail, Pope, Stevens, Traverse and Wadena counties.

WCMCA Head Start operated 9 full-day classrooms and 9 half-day classrooms providing services from September – May.

Home based services are offered year-round with 11 Home Visitors providing weekly home visits to each enrolled family as well as 2 parent socialization events a month.

We operated with in-person, hybrid and virtual flexibility to serve our families and communities during the pandemic.

99% of HS children and 100% EHS

- participants have health insurance.
- # 99% of HS children and 100% of EHS children have a medical home.
- 89% of HS children and 33% of EHS children are up-to-date on well child care.

Health Services at End of Enrollment

- # 97% of HS children and 79% of EHS children are current on immunizations.
- 86% of HS children have completed a dental exam and 83% of EHS children have a dental home.
- 387 parents volunteered for a total of 17,592 hours.
- 94% of families received services such as housing assistance, ESL, emergency intervention, asset building, health or parent education, etc.
- 52 mental health referrals were made and 25 children are received services as a result.


At the end of the year, 23% of children were on an IEP/IFSP and receiving services

School Readiness: WCMCA Head Start helps children succeed by linking Curriculum and Assessment, using observation-based assessment information to individualize children's learning. According to the American Community Survey (a demographics survey conducted by the US Census Bureau) our program served 40% of the eligible children in our service area. The most underserved in our area is children 2 years of age and younger.



Overall Program Averages:

- 4-Year-Old Children in Head Start 2020/21-88.6% Meeting/Exceeding TSG Widely Held Expectations.
- 4-Year-Old Children in Head Start 2019/20- 92.5% Meeting/Exceeding TSG Widely Held Expectations.
- 4-Year-Old Children in Head Start 2018/19- 94.9% Meeting/Exceeding TSG Widely Held Expectations.

WCMCA Head Start's main objective is to align with parents and families to prepare their child for Kindergarten.

School Readiness: "Children possessing the skills, knowledge and attitudes necessary for success in school and for later learning in life." (Office of Head Start)

WCMCA Head Start School Readiness Goals follow a birth to age five approach and align with the Minnesota Early Childhood Indicators of Progress, the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework (HSELOF) and the Parent, Family and Community Engagement (PFCE) Outcomes Framework.

Evidence-based curriculum and assessment are used to measure child outcomes and to plan for individualized instruction that supports the development of each child.

WCMCA Head Start's school readiness goals are organized into five Development Domains. Teaching Strategies GOLD Report Cards are share with families three times per year (Fall, Winter and Spring.)

Domains of School Readiness:

- Approaches to Learning
- Social Emotional Development
- Language and Literacy
- Cognition
- Perceptual Motor and Physical Development

Researched-Based Teaching Curriculums:

- Partners for a Healthy Baby (Prenatal to age 5): Focuses on strengthening the family by addressing the overall well-being of both the child and the family.
- Creative Curriculum (Birth to age 5): Supports teachers to create meaningful daily routines, environments and learning experiences for children.

Assessment and Screening Tools:

- Brigance Inventory of Early Childhood Development III

Strategies to Support School Readiness

- 1. Head Start classes that meet four days per week for either half-day or full day sessions. Families in these classrooms also receive four home visits during the program year. Families are given a calendar each month with scheduled center days and a newsletter which includes information about classroom activities and upcoming events.
- 2. **Early Head Start Home-Based Programming**. Early Head Start serves children birth to three years of age and expectant families in full year programming. Families enrolled in this option receive weekly home visits. Parents are supported as their child's most influential and valuable teacher in promoting their child's development.
- 3. Early Head Start Socializations. Opportunities are held 22 times per year. Participation in these events with other parents and children is an essential piece of the programming. Parents will interact with their child in a variety of activities, promoting their interests and supporting the development of new skills.
- 4. **Parent Teacher Conferences**. Each family participates in 2 parent teacher conferences each year. Child's progress and accomplishments are discussed and parents and teachers set goals for the child.
- 5. Family Partnership. Staff create a partnership with families to meet identified need and goals.
