
WCMCA, Inc. never closed our doors during COVID, we maintained safe and socially-distanced office space for staff and clients in Alexandria, Elbow Lake, and Moorhead. One of the ramifications of COVID has been hiring, and we have found that more challenging than ever before. We have filled open positions, but in some cases it has taken longer, with more demands from prospective employees.

## **COMMUNITY LAND TRUST**



A Community Land Trust, providing affordable homeownership, buys or receives donated land and builds new homes and/ or acquires and rehabilitates exiting homes, and makes these homes available for sale to limited-income homebuyers, writing down the purchase price to an affordable level through the use of public and/or private subsidies.

The CLT sells the home at an affordable price to an eligible, qualified homebuyer household, but retains ownership of the land parcel on which the home sits, leasing the parcel to the homeowner through a 99-year, inheritable, renewable ground lease.

The households utilize the time in Launch Pad to accomplish goals created by the client with the assistance of their case manager, during intensive case management required of the program.

Goals may include but are not limited to:

- Securing or increasing employment/income
- Securing daycare
- Applying for benefits such as SNAP, Medical Assistance, MFIP, and daycare assistance
- · Resintating a driver's license
- Paying off fines
- Searching for safe, stable, and affordable housing,

in whatever capacity that may be.

There is no set amount of time households are able to stay, as long as they are working toward completing their goal plan.

Launch Pad began providing shelter for clients in June 2020. Since then, 21 households have been served, including five unaccompanied youth households.

Of the 19 who have exited, two exited to an unsubsidized rental, one exited to college, three to subsized housing, and 13 to a subsidized program through WCMCA. Two households are currently enrolled in the program, as of April 2023.




LAUNCH PAD **TEMPORARY SHELTER HOUSING**

## **2022 CARDBOARD BRIGADE** FOR HOMELESSNESS AWARNESS

On November 15, 2022, the Family and **Community Services Department along** with volunteers from other departments, partnering agencies, community members, and agency clients held our annual Cardboard Brigade in Alexandria, MN.

This event is held yearly during National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness week.

From 3:30-5:00pm, those partaking in the Cardboard Brigade held statistics about hunger and homelessness along the busy Broadway Street. Some stopped to read our signs, some thanked us for the work we do and awareness we were spreading, while others were not as friendly.

This event is extremely eye opening every year and gives a very slight glimpse at the treatment of our homeless community members.

In 2021, we began a homeless drive for needed items for the homeless households we serve. We collect winter hats and gloves, winter jackets, hand warmers, non-perishable food items, person hygiene items, and monetary donations.

## **2022 SPRING STORM RELIEF FUNDS**

#### In May of 2022, tornadoes left a great deal of damage within the counties we serve, primarily Douglas County in the Forada area.

Many people were left with extensive amounts of damage and many the loss of their homes. Households affected were thrown many additional obstacles including long wait times for insurance adjusters and contractors, high insurance deductibles, and insurance not meeting the needs of the damage.

The Alexandria Community Giving Foundation raised funds for the storm victims. Those funds were then awarded to WCMCA to assist the storm victims with needed items and work such as tree removal, gift cards, mortgage payments, rent payments to temporary housing, insurance deductibles, utilities and other miscellaneous needs.


## MINNESOTA LIVE WELL AT HOME<sup>544</sup>



The WCMCA Home Care & Repair program offers homemaking and chore services through a fulltime Maintenance Provider and volunteer staff.

Our full-time maintenance provider or a friendly volunteer works within residences to complete home projects. Services are billed at an hourly rate which is calculated using the client's net income. There is an annual cost-sharing fee for each client.

The goal is to provide these services so older adults can continue to live in their home as long as it is safe for them to do so. This program is intended for adults age 65 and older living in Douglas, Grant, Pope, Stevens or Traverse county.

## **EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAMS**, **WORKSHOPS & CLASSES**

## **A MATTER OF BALANCE**

West Central Minnesota Communities Action, Inc. works in partnership with funding through the Dancing Sky Area Agency on Aging, in order to present A Matter of Balance workshops.

A Matter of Balance is among 19 nationally recognized evidence-based programs represented by the Evidence Based Leadership Collaborative (EBLC).

The mission of the EBLC is to increase delivery of evidence-based programs that improve the health and wellbeing of diverse populations.

The program is specifically designed to reduce the fear of falling and improve activity levels among communitydwelling older adults. The program includes eight two-hour classes presented to a small group of 8-12 participants led by trained coaches.

The program enables participants to reduce the fear of falling by learning to view falls as controllable, setting goals for increasing activity levels, making small changes to reduce fall risks at home, and exercise to increase strength and balance.

## **ENHANCE FITNESS**

#### West Central Minnesota Communities Action, Inc. works in partnership with the Alexandria Area YMCA to teach Enhance Fitness Classes.

Enhance Fitness is an evidence-based group exercise program for older adults that uses simple, easy to learn movements that motivate individuals (particularly those with arthritis) to stay active throughout their life.

Throughout the county, a growing number of Y Associations are offering Enhance Fitness Classes.

The Enhance Fitness Group Exercise Program consists of 16-Week sessions, where classes are held 3 times per week and are 60 minutes in length. Each class session includes cardiovascular, strength training, balance and flexibility exercises and the fostering of strong social relationships between participants.

Those with chronic conditions, such as arthritis, need not worry as they will not do anything that hurts. Participants can use chairs for support if necessary, can remain seated doing modified movements and increase the weight they use for strength training at their own pace.
